8. Project Description (less than 100 words)	
Acquisition of 126 undeveloped acres adjacent to the City of San Diego's El Capitan Reservoir from a willing seller. Acquisition has been identified as a priority for water supply protection. The parcel is also within a pre-approved mitigation area for the MSCP. The property contains a portion of Peutz Creek, which drains an emerging housing area of Alpine and provides natural treatment to urban runoff. The property has a popular bike trail which can be protected. Acquisition is supported by the County of San Diego, City of San Diego, Trust for Public Lands and the San Diego River Coalition.
